



Second Reading: This text uses various images to illustrate how damaging and hurtful the way we speak to and about others can be. Not only are we to control our speech, but what we say and how we say it are to reflect our faith.

Gospel: This story provides the turning point in Mark's gospel. Peter is the first human being in the narrative to acknowledge Jesus as the Messiah, but he cannot accept that as the Messiah, Jesus will have to suffer. Moreover, Jesus issues a strong challenge to all by connecting discipleship and the cross.

Evening Hymn: This paraphrase and commentary of today's gospel reading expands our Lord's command to "take up our cross and follow." In taking the cross, the final stanza tells us we "clina to God's Word" as we are freed from sin and all temptation by the promise given to us in Holy Baptism.

Apostles' Creed: This is the faith into which all Christians are baptized. As we confess our faith in Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, recall that through God's Word and the Holy Spirit, we are joined to Christ's death and resurrection, and given a promise of life in Him.


